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
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

















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JAWAHARLAL NEHRU HOCKEY TOURNAMENT SOCIETY SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2019-20

Each year is a time for reflection over the activities of the past year and to put on record the achievements of the Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society. Another successful season in 2019-20 was conducted with the completion of our five annual tournaments. The standard of competitions continues to improve every year. I take this opportunity to congratulate all the winners of our annual tournaments in the season gone by and to all participating teams in all our competitions.

JNHTS has been very fortunate that several sports-minded personalities have associated themselves with the Society with the sole aim of improving and popularising the national game of hockey. The JNHTS has always endeared itself to the high ideals set by the founding fathers of the Society, almost 56 years ago. We at the JNHTS continue to support and encourage talent at every level.

As in the past years, this year also the Society successfully conducted as many as five most popular tournaments for boys, girls, senior men and universities, starting from October 17, 2019 which concluded with the 48th Nehru Junior Hockey Tournament on December 25, 2019. These tournaments, considered most praiseworthy events, continued in spite of nagging financial constraints.

Our series of annual tournaments received lot of encouragement from the fans who thronged the stadium to watch the players in action. Here is a brief resume of the tournaments conducted last season (for future report, please see "Five Jewels of Nehru Hockey).

STEELBIRD HELMET-37th Nehru Sub-Junior Hockey Tournament

MPHA Bhopal pumped 11 goals against their opponents in their last two matches when it mattered the most while conceding just three goals, to lift the 37th Nehru Sub-Junior Hockey Tournament for under-15 boys which was held at New Delhi's MDC National Stadium from October 17-30.

The Bhopal school clinched their semifinal outing against Guru Gobind Singh Sports College, Lucknow, winning the eight goals contest 5-3. The other semi-final also ended with the same scoreline in favour of Town Government High School, Sundergarh (Odisha) playing against old favourites CRZ Senior Secondary School, Sonepat (Haryana). The final, however, was far from an even contest with MPHA Bhopal firing all cylinders against the Sundergarh lads to clinch the title by a huge margin of 6-0.

The winners took home the glittering Nehru Sub-Junior Trophy and a prize purse of Rs 1,60,000, while their coach, Olympian Mr. Rajinder Singh also bagged the 'Winning Team Coach' prize and received a purse of Rs 15,000 in appreciation. Town Government High School, Sundergarh collected the runners-up purse of Rs 96,000, while their coach, Mr Bijay Kumar Lakra received a purse of Rs 10,000 for the 'Runners-up Team Coach'.

Ankit Pal (Shirt No. 15) of MPHA Bhopal bagged the 'Pushp Naranjan Best Player of the Tournament Award' and prize money of Rs 25,000. The 'Fair Play Trophy' in the memory of hockey legend and one of the founding fathers of Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society (JNHTS), the late Mr K.G. Kakkar, was awarded to SNBP School, Pune.

Earlier, 34 schools teams from across the country, nominated by 29 state governments, IPSC, DG-NCC, Army Sports Control Board, CBSE and Kendriya Vidyalaya took part in the prestigious 37th edition of the Nehru Sub-Junior Boys Hockey Tournament. The tournament got off to a splendid inaugural ceremony which was presided by JNHTS President and Chairman of Steelbird Hi-Tech India Ltd., Mr Subhash Kapur.

JNHTS's Secretary General, Mr Kukoo Walia took the opportunity to thank the JNHTS President, the sponsors and media for extending their overwhelming support for the conduct of the premier boys' hockey tournament.

SNBP-27th Nehru All India Inter Univ Hockey Tournament

Uttar Pradesh once again signaled its domination in grass root hockey as MGKV University Varanasi were crowned champions of the SNBP-27th Nehru-All India Inter University hockey tournament held at the LNIPE ground, Gwalior from November 3-12, 2019. Amongst the semi-finalists were two teams from Uttar Pradesh this year, the other semi-finalist being VBSP University, Jaunpur.

In a highly contested final, MGKV University, Varanasi finished on top with a brilliant 2-1 victory against Bangalore Central University to lift the Nehru Trophy. Earlier in the semi-final, MGKV University, Varanasi outclassed VBSP University, Jaunpur by a 2-0 margin. Bangalore Central University wrapped up the five-goal contest against MDU Rohtak in the other semifinal.

In the playoff for the third place, VBSP University, Jaunpur notched up a thrilling 5-3 win against MDU Rohtak.

In the individual honours category, Mukul Sharma (Shirt No. 4) of MGKV University, Varanasi was declared the 'Best Player of the Match' and he received an exquisite Flash hockey stick. Harsdeep Kapur (Shirt No.4) of Banaras Hindu University was declared the 'Best Player of the Tournament'. He received the Pushp Naranjan cash prize of Rs 25,000. LNIPE University, Gwalior received the 'Fair Play Trophy' in the sweet memory of Shri Saiyid Hamid, one of the founding fathers of Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society.

The top-16 university teams from across the country were invited to participate in the tournament top-four teams qualified from each zone, emerging from their respective zonal tournaments, North, South, East and West zones. The 16 teams were divided into four groups and the top-two teams were eligible to play the semi-finals.

This year the tournament was inaugurated by the LNIPE vice-chancellor, Prof. Dilip Kumar Dureha. Dr Vrishali Bhosale, President, SNBP Group of Institute presided over the finals and distributed the prizes. The tournament was Title sponsored by SNBP Group of Institute, Pune and was Co-sponsored by Shri Sumant Bhasin.

The eventual winners sustained high pressure in two back-to-back matches to deservingly clinch the Charanjit Rai-26th Nehru Girls Hockey title for under-17. In the title clash, Kiddy's Corner Higher Secondary School maintained their slender 1-0 lead over Directorate General NCC till the last minute after romping into the final with a 4-0 win against Tika Ram Senior Secondary School (Haryana) earlier.

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The Advent of the Nehru Hockey Tournament Society (The Cradle of Indian Hockey)

The advent of Nehru Hockey's Senior open tournament in Delhi in the mid-60's was a boost in the arm for the game. It soon became a popular tournament attracting the cream of talent from all over the country. The tournament discovered some brilliant players, most of whom went on to wear national colours. The Nehru tournament, in fact, was the best thing that happened to Indian hockey and when the organizers with some big names as patrons and a bunch of keen enthusiasts from the bureaucracy running the show expanded the idea and introduced tournaments for juniors and subjuniors, the public feeling was that Indian hockey had at last found a good base to sustain itself. All these ventures provided some top class hockey to crowds, which flocked to the then Lady Harding Ground (now called the Shivaji Stadium).

In fact, Hockey India, the National authority presently controlling the game in the country and the Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society are complimentary to each other. Both are in the field to promote the National game at every nook and corner of the country. According to keen observers the Nehru Hockey Tournament's contribution to Indian hockey can never be overstated. The two are closely linked and must continue their association.

The Society's role in promoting the National game of hockey in the country came in for high praise from none else than the former Chief of the International Hockey Federation (FIH) Ms Els Van Breda Vriesman herself. In a message to the Society, she said: "I commend the organizers of the Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society for their efforts in working to identify new

talent and to strengthen the base level appeal of Hockey in India. With hard work at all levels, India can be a dominant force in hockey once again". She emphasized that "a significant aspect of the Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament from a global perspective has been the introduction of a girls competition for players under 17.. Congratulations on your impressive efforts and continue the good work", concluded the FIH chief.

Another former FIH Chief Leandro Negre has also a word of praise. He said: "A fine example of dedication is the Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament. It is aimed towards improving standards, searching for fresh talents, to restoring India's national game to the top of the international hockey world."

The Society has a very high profile administration with some influential people who have held senior-most positions in the Government and have at the same time been connected with the game at one stage or the other. It has now entered into the 54th year of its fruitful existence.

What prompted the birth of the Society is an interesting story, worth recalling, though briefly. The shock defeat of the Indian team in the 1960 Rome Olympics final to our arch-rivals Pakistan, breaking the country's longest chain of success in Olympic Games since as far back as in 1928, brought an amalgamation of hockey lovers and Olympians, who had put their collective ideas for the revival of the National game, formed the Society in1964, named after the sports loving country's first Prime Minister, Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru.

Persons in high positions in the Union Government came forward to give the Society a proper shape and identity and also a system by heading this nascent organisation. Such bia names as those of Union Cabinet Minister A.K. Sen (Law), Y.B. Chavan (Defence), Ram Niwas Mirdha (Communication) and Sharad Pawar (Agriculture) gave it a boost. The other celebrities like H.C. Sarin (Secretary, Defence), S. Ratnam (Secretary, Finance), Maj. General Virendra Singh (DG, NCC), Saiyid Hamid (Chancellor, Hamdard University) and Subir Raha (Chairman, ONGC) involved themselves wholeheartedly and became an integral part of the Society. Shri Arun Subhashchandra Yadav (a former Union Minister) is the President, Shri Samar Hamid, Lt. Gen. (Retd.) Anil Malik, AVSM, Dr. D.R. Saini, Dr. Harsh Pathak, Shri H.S. Hanspal, Shri Subhash Kapur, Dr. Dilip Tirkey, M.P., Shri Surender Yadav, IPS, Additional Commissioner of Police, Anticorruption Bureau, and Shri Bhupinder Singh, IRS are Vice-Presidents.

Not so long ago the supreme head of the nation used to personally preside over the final of the Main Tournament. The exalted personalities were Dr. S. Radhakrishan, Dr. Zakir Hussain, Shri V. V. Giri, Shri Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed, Shri Neelam Sanjiva Reddy and Giani Zail Singh. In the inaugural year (1964) the function was inaugurated by Smt. Vijayalakshmi Pandit and presided over by PM Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri.

The Society's Secretariat is presently run by Secretary General Shri Kukoo Walia, besides a band of dedicated hockey lovers and experienced administrators that include Secretary Shri Rohit Chauhan, Joint Secretaries, Shri Ajay Jethi & Shri Ashutosh Verma, Shri I.D. Kapur – Treasurer and Shri A.P. Kaushik as Asstt. Treasurer, Shri Gyan Chand-Asstt. Secretary, Shri Arun Kumar, Manager Public Relations and Shri M.N. Shome as Chief Editor just to name a few among many others.

The Society began its activities in 1964 with a Senior Open Tournament. Inspired by its instant success as it attracted a good number of recognized foreign teams, it started age-group

competitions in 1972 for under-17 and later under-15 school boys. The Union Government scholarships and prize money are awarded to the winners and outstanding players as incentive to attract the youngsters to the National game. It also prompted the Society to seriously promote the game at the university level in order to build up a strong second line of defence through the youth power. And in consultation with the Association of Indian Universities (AIU) conceived the Champion Colleges Tournament in 1993.

To maintain equality of sex and gender, the girls were not left behind. On a proposal from the Indian Women's Hockey Federation, the Society started the school girls tournament (under-17 years) in 1993.

There was a time when hockey was one of the most popular sports in the capital. Lack of proper exposure at an early stage has been often blamed for India's failure to groom raw talent into world-beaters.

The vibrant Secretary General of Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society (JNHTS), Shri Kukoo Walia felt that he didn't want the city next generation of hockey players to suffer. With that aim in mind, he came out with the idea of conducting a tournament annually for the school-going boys and girls of the Indian Capital. Named after hockey wizard and legend Dhyan Chand, the Nehru-Dhyan Chand Cup for Delhi boys and girls (u-15 years) was added to the series of annual tournaments that the Society was already organizing over several decades.

It was decided that the finals of Nehru-Dhyan Chand Cup (both boys and girls sections) would be held on the birth anniversary of the legend (August 29) every year. It is the Society's humble tribute to Dhyan Chand and hockey.

PRESIDENT PRESENTS NATIONAL SPORTS AWARDS

Come August 29. The day happens to be the birth anniversary of the nation's greatest ever sportsman, Major Dhyan Chand: In order to respectfully celebrate the occasion, the date has been designated as the National Sports Day by the Government of India.



To commemorate the legend's birth anniversary on this day, the Supreme Head of the nation in the presence of distinguished guests, media personnel and star sportspersons, personally presides over the Arjuna and other six categories of the highest National Sports Awards presentation ceremony with all solemnity it deserves at the gorgeous Ashoka Hall in the Rashtrapati Bhawan.

The Arjuna Award, the Union Government's one of the top sports honour specifically meant for outstanding sportsman and women of the country, has generated into a purposeful institution, established in 1961. Arjuna, the greatest warrior of an era and the mighty hero of the epic Mahabharta, must be turning up in his heavenly abode, for, the Award is named after him. The Award is given away to outstanding sportsmen and women, who have exhibited superb performance consistently for the previous four vears at the international level and have shown qualities of leadership, sportsmanship and a sense of discipline. The awardees are given a statuette, a Certificate, Ceremonial dress and a cash award of Rs 5 lakhs.

So far, over 80 hockey players both men and women have been bestowed the honour. Three more hockey names were added to the list on August 29, 2016. They are drag flick expert VR Raghunath and women's team striker Ms Rani (both honoured with Arjuna Awards); and 70-year-old veteran Olympian Sylvanus Dung Dung (Maj Dhyan Chand Life Time Achievement Award).

Arjuna Awards

V.R Raghunath made his debut in the senior men's squad in 2006 during the bi-lateral series against Pakistan. He has since been an integral part of the national team's defence structure and is counted as one of the best drag-flickers in the country. He was a member of the Indian team that won the Bronze Medal in the 2007 Sultan Azlan Shah Cup, Silver in 2008, Gold in the 2007 Asia

Cup, and a Silver in 2013 Asia Cup where he scored six goals for the team. He was one of the key members of the squad in the 2014 Asian Games where India won the Gold after nearly three decades and secured a berth for the Rio Olympics.

After Ashish Ballal and A.B. Subbaiah were chosen for the award in 1996, Raghunath is the third hockey player from Karnataka to receive this honour.

Ms Rani was awarded the prestigious Arjuna Award for her outstanding contributions in the field of hockey. Before her only two women hockey players have received the Arjuna Award - Surinder Kaur (former captain of the Women's National Hockey team) and Jasjeet Kaur.

Rani was part of the Indian women's hockey team which competed at the Rio Olympics in 2016. The 23-year-old became the youngest player in Indian hockey history when she represented the national team in the 2010 World Cup at the tender age of 15.

Born in 1994 in Shahabad Markanda in the Kurukshetra district of Haryana, to a poor family she took to field hockey in 2003 and trained at the Shahbad Hockey Academy under Baldev Singh, a recipient of Dronacharya Award. Rani played in the Champion's Challenge Tournament held in Kazan, Russia in June 2009 and powered India to a win by scoring 4 goals in the finals. She was adjudged "The Top Goal Scorer" and the "Young Player of the Tournament"

She was instrumental in winning the silver medal for India in the Asia Cup held in Nov 2009 After playing with India's national team at 2010 Commonwealth Games and 2010 Asian Games, Rani was included in the FIH Women's All Star Team of 2010. She was also included the All Star team of the Asian Hockey Federation based on her performance in 2010 Asian Games at Guangzhou, where the Indian team finished fourth.

At the 2010 Women's Hockey World Cup held in Rosario, Argentina, she scored a total of seven goals which placed India in the ninth position in World Women's hockey rankings. This is India's best performance since 1978.

She is the only Indian to be nominated for the FIH Women's Young Player of the Year Aware, 2010. She was conferred the "Best Young Player of the Tournament" award at the Women's Hockey World Cup 2010, recognizing her stellar performance as the top field goal scorer in the tournament.

She was also adjudged the 'Player of the Tournament' at the 2013 Junior World Cup in which India finished with a bronze medal. She has been named for FICCI Comeback of the Year Award 2014.

Dhyan Chand Award

The Dhyan Chand Award, officially known as Dhyan Chand Award for Lifetime Achievement in Sports and Games, is named after hockey wizard Maj Dhyan Chand (1905-79) who dominated the world of hockey from 1926-48. The award comprises a statuette, a certificate, ceremonial dress and a cash prize of 05 lakh.

Former Indian field hockey player Sylvanus Dung Dung (70), who was part of the Olympic Gold Medal winning team in 1980, was on Aug 29, 2016 honoured with the Dhyan Chand Lifetime Achievement Award.

Dung Dung, an unsung hero of Indian hockey, had struck the golden goal against Spain in 1980

which brought home the elusive Gold Medal for India after a disappointing outing for the nation in the Montreal Olympics in 19/6 when India had missed the podium.

Born in the Simdega district of Jharkhand in 1941, Dung Dung joined the Indian Army in 1965 on his 24th birthday. He had a passion for hockey. The 1980 Moscow Olympics was the turning point in his career. He was an intelligent player who possessed the needed stamina and power to tackle many an opposition.

Dung Dung was at his personal best. In no time, the scores were level at 3 -3. Tensions were building up. Dung Dung lived up to the occasion and struck that decisive golden goal and handed the nation an unprecedented 8th gold medal at the Olympics.

He also played 8 Test matches against Holland (19/7-/8), 4 Test matches against Pakistan (1978), and the 4-Nation Quadrangular held in Kuala Lumpur (1980). He represented Bihar between 1977 and 1981 and Services in the national hockey championship for the Rangaswami Cup.

An experienced right-back, he successfully coached the Central Command team from Lucknow to four consecutive triumphs in the Army hockey championship. He retired in the year 1988.

HONORARY DOCTORATE FOR SANDEEP SINGH

Sandeep Singh (born 27 February 1986), a full-back and a dreaded drag-flicker in his hey days, was bestowed with the honour an Honorary Doctorate for sporting excellence by Desh Bhagat University, a private educational institution in Amioh, Fatehgarh Sahib district of Punjab, in February 2017.

Sandeep is only second Indian player after former captain and sitting Member of Parliament, Dalip Tirkey, to have an honorary degree for sporting excellence. Tirkey received an honorary degree from Sambalpur University in 2010.

"It is a big honour for me. It's a big thing for me to receive such a degree for my achievements in the field of sports. It is a recognition for my hard work," Sandeep said after receiving the degree He received the Arjuna Award in 2010.

Once regarded as the country's top drag-flicker, Sandeep has been in and out of the national team since the 2012 London Olympics mainly due to injury.

Sandeep made headlines when he was seriously injured after being hit by an accidental gunshot in Shatabadi Express in August 2006 while he was on his way to join the national team due to leave for the World Cup in Germany two days later. Sandeep was almost paralysed and on wheel chair for two years. He not only recovered from the serious injury, but also made a stunning comeback and established himself in the Indian team.

Under his captaincy, the Indian team managed to clinch the Sultan Azlan Shah Cup in 2009 after defeating Malaysia in the finals at Ipoh. India won the title after a long wait of 13 years. Sandeep was also the top goal scorer of the tournament.

Sandeep Singh) is an Indian professional field hockey player and an ex-captain of the Indian national team. He generally features as a full back and is a penalty corner specialist for the team. Singh's international debut was in January 2004 in Sultan Azlan Shah Cup in Kuala Lumpur. He took over as the captain of the Indian national team in January 2009, and Raipal Singh succeeded him later in 2010.

At a time he was said to have the best speed in the world in drag flick (speed 145 km/h).

The India men's national hockey team qualified for the 2012 Summer Olympics in London after a gap of eight years, having missed the bus in Beijing it) 2008. The team had a resounding victory over France in the finals of the Olympic qualifiers by beating France 8-1. Sandeep Singh starred in the final by scoring five goals - including a hat-trick - all from penalty corners. He was the highest scorer of the Olympic qualifiers tournament by scoring 16 goals.

Scoring 11 goals in 12 games, Sandeep emerged as the top scorer in the first edition of Hockey India's League in 2014 for Punjab Warriors. After two seasons he was signed by Ranchi Rays for \$81,000.

Nehru Hockey Society's Secretary General Shri Kukoo Walia has expressed his happiness over the award being bestowed on the star player Sandeep. "He deserves such an honour as his life is an example of how one can emerge on top even after such a major accident. Such an honour should encourage young players to work hard against all odds", Shri Kukoo Walia said.



PADMA SHRI HONOUR FOR P.R. SREEJESH

Indian Hockey received another great recognition when the Government of India honoured the national men's team skipper Parattu Raveendran Sreejesh with the "Padma Shri", coinciding with the nation's 68th Republic Day. Regarded as one of the most reliable goalkeepers in the world, Sreejesh dedicated the award to his teammates.

Born on May 8, 1986, in Kizhakkambalam village, in the Ernakulam district of Kerala, Sreejesh was earlier honoured with the Arjuna Award in 2015. He is only the second goalkeeper after Shankar Laxman (1967) to receive the honour. Known as 'The Wall of Indian Hockey' for his several brilliant saves under the bar, Sreejesh has won several honours in the past for his achievements. He was awarded the Best Goalkeeper of the Tournament when India won the Asian Cup in 2008. His second 'Best Goalkeeper of the Tournament' award came at the 2013 Asia Cup, with India finishing second in the tournament.

At the 2014 Champions Trophy, he was adjudged Goalkeeper of the Tournament. Following impressive performances in the same year, he was nominated for the award of Best Male Goalkeeper which the eventually lost to Jaap Stockmann of the Netherlands.

Sreejesh has also been made a Member of International Hockey Federation (FIH) Athletes' Committee.

He began his sports career as a shot-putter during his school days before switching over to hockey. Sreejesh made it to the junior national team in 2004, in a match against Australia in Perth. Two years later, he made his debut in the Senior national team, at the South Asian Games in Colombo. Having been a part of the Indian team for six years, though often losing his place to senior goalkeepers Adrian D'Souza and Bharat Chettri, he became a regular member since 2011, after his match-winning two penalty stroke saves against Pakistan in the Asian Champions Trophy final in Ordos City, China. Ever since, he has been instrumental in helping India win several important tournaments. Sreejesh was also part of the team that won the silver medal at the 2014 Commonwealth Games but his penalty stroke saves in the final of the Asian Games in 2014 will remain as one of his best performances till date. The team won the historic gold and booked its Rio Olympics berth. In 2016, he led the Indian team to another momentous feat at the FIH Champions Trophy in London where the team won a historic silver medal. He also led the team to a splendid win against Pakistan in the final of the Asian Champions Trophy in Kuantan last year.

He was the captain of the team that won the silver medal at the 2016 Men's Hockey Champions Trophy held at London. In the Rio Summer Olympics in 2016, Sreejesh led the Indian team to the guarter-finals.

At the auction of the inaugural season of the Hockey India League, Sreejesh was bought by the Mumbai franchise for \$38,000. He has since played two seasons for their team, Mumbai Magicians. Prior to the 2015 season, he was bought by Uttar Pradesh Wizards for \$69,000.

Sreejesh is married to Aneeshya, a formewr long jumper and an Ayurveda Doctor. They have two-years old daughter Anusree. He is currently employed as Chief Sports Organiser with the Kerala Government's Education Department.

The latest honour for Sreejesh has come at a time when Indian Hockey is showing signs of revival with some sterling performances in International tournaments. Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society's Secretary General Shri Kukoo Walia has expressed his immense pleasure at Sreejesh getting the prestigious Padma Shri Award.

Shri Kukoo Walia said: "Sreejesh joins the elite panel of legendary hockey players who have been honoured by the Indian Government in the past for their yeomen's service to the national game. He richly deserves the government recognition. We at the JNHTS feel proud of his achievements and are confident that under his able leadership Indian Hockey will reach greater heights in the near future."

PRESIDENT HONOURS HOCKEY STARS

India remembers its hockey wizard and one of the greatest hockey players of all time, the late Maj Dhyan Chand, on his birth anniversary which falls on August 29 by observing the day every year as National Sports Day. Several sports-related events are held at various cities to mark the occasion and to remember the achievements of Maj Dhyan Chand, who was known for his extraordinary goal-scoring feats, in addition to earning three Olympic gold medals (1928,1932, and 1936) in field hockey, during an era when India was the most dominant team in Hockey.

It is on this day (Aug 29) that Honourable President of India honours sportspersons from different disciplines for their contribution to their respective sport. This year, three hockey stalwarts were bestowed the honour by Honourable President Shri Ram Nath Kovind on the occasion of National Sports Day at the Rashtrapati Bhawan. The three hockey players thus honoured were: former India captain Sardar Singh (Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award), S V Sunil (Arjuna Award) and P A Rafael (Dronacharya Award). Sardar Singh became the second hockey star to be conferred the Khel Ratna after the legendary Dhanraj PiUay who received the award in the year 2000.

The Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna is the highest sporting honour of the Republic of India. The award is named after Rajiv Gandhi, former Prime Minister of India who served the office from 1984 to 1989. Its awarded annually by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. The recipient(s) is/are selected by a committee constituted by the Ministry and is honoured for their "spectacular and most outstanding performance in the field of sports over a period of four years" at international level. As of 2017, the award comprises a medallion, a certificate, and a cash prize of Rs 7.5 lakh.

Sardar, who made his international debut against arch-rivals Pakistan in 2006, was named captain of the Indian hockey squad after the debacle at the 2012 Olympics in London where the team finished last in the 12-nation field. With Sardar as captain, India won gold at the 2014 Asian Games and the continental title at the 2007 Asian Cup. He also led the national team to the bronze medal at the Hockey World League in 2015. The 31-year-old from Sirsa district of Haryana was included in the 18-member FIH All-Star team in 2010 and 2011. He is also the recipient of Padma Shri and Arjuna Award. He was awarded the Player of the Tournament in the 2012 Sultan Azlan Shah Cup, 2012 Olympic Qualifiers and 2010 Sultan Azlan Shah Cup. In 2012, Sardar won the Asian Men's Player of the Year. He was also signed by Dutch club HC Bloemendaal to play in the Euro League in 2013 and has won the Coal India HIL Trophy twice, with the Delhi Waveriders (2013) and Jaypee Punjab Warriors (2016) teams.

Sardar shared his conversation with the President at the time of receiving the award and how he found himself at loss of words. Aap ka naam Sardar hai. Pata hai iska matlab kya hota hai? (your name is Sardar. Do you know what does it mean?" the President asked Sardar during their conversation at the awards ceremony. "you have served the country like your name, done us proud," the President said. Sardar said he "felt an increased sense of responsibility after getting the Khel Ratna," but also admitted that "there's a different confidence since receiving the award, a positive energy." Indian hockey team forward Somwarpet Vittalacharya Sunil better known as S V Sunil, received the prestigious Arjuna Award from the President.

The Arjuna Awards named after the greatest warrior of an era and the mighty hero of the epic Maharashtra are given by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, government of India to recognize outstanding achievement in National Sports Instituted in 1961, the award carries a cash prize of Rs 500,000, a bronze statue of Arjuna and a scroll. Sunil is the 60th hockey player among men to receive the Arjuna Award. As many as 25 women hockey players have also received the honour in the past.

The Bengaluru player was earlier named the Asian Player of the Year 2016. S V Sunil is an Indian field hockey player well known for his swiftness on the field. Regarded as one of the fastest players in the game, Sunil made his international debut at the young age of 18. With 11 years of experience, S V Sunil is presently one of the key members in the Indian hockey team. He was part of the team in the year 2008 for the Sultan Azlan Shah Cup, in which India won the silver medal. In 2011, he played in the Champion's Challenge and scored four stunning goals, the most by any Indian forwarder. He was also part of the team that secured gold in 2014 at the Asian Games at Incheon. Sunil was part of the team in the Hero Champions Trophy 2016 and won the silver medal. "It is every sportsperson's dream to receive this award. I feel lucky. Personally, it means a lot to me. It is a huge boost and motivation for me and others players. When you get such awards, it's a recognition of the hard work that each player puts in," he said and dedicated the award to his parents.

Veteran hockey coach Pankaj Auso Raphel was conferred with Dronacharya Award this year. Raphel has been given the honour as lifetime achievement.

The Dronacharya Award for Outstanding Coaches in Sports and Games is sports coaching honour of the Republic of India. The award is named after Guru Dronacharya from the epic Mahabharata. He was master of advanced military warfare and was appointed as the royal preceptor to the Kaurava and the Pandava princes for their training in military arts and astras (Divine weapons).

It is awarded annually by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. Recipients are selected by a committee constituted by the Ministry and are honoured to have done "outstanding and meritorious work on a consistent basis and enabled sportspersons to excel in international events" over a period of four years. Two awards are designated for the lifetime contribution in coaching where the achievements in producing "outstanding sportspersons" over a period of 20 years or more are considered. As of 2017, the award comprises a bronze statuette of Dronacharya, a certificate, ceremonial dress, and a cash prize of Rs 5 lakh.

Rafael is the ninth hockey player to receive this award. Life has come a full circle for P.A. Rafael, the veteran hockey coach from Kerala. In 1964, the Indian Hockey Federation (IHF) recommended him for the coveted recognition. But, his name was struck down from the list. Rafael has an eventful history in Indian hockey. He introduced revolutionary changes in the way the national game is being played in India. Rafael fell out of favour with the (IHF) in the name of the path breaking changes he ushered in. When the National Hockey Academy was established in 1992, with the sponsorship of Air India, Rafael was appointed there as its head coach and director. There he mentored several stars who later played in the Olympics and the World Cup.

With Indian men's team scheduled to take part in some major international events later this year, including Asia Cup (Dhaka, Oct 11-22) and World Hockey League Final at Bhubaneshwar (Dec 1-10), these awards should surely act as a big boost to the players and the team as well.

ASIAN AWARDS FOR S.V. SUNIL, HARMANPREET

Indian forward S.V Sunil and dragflicker Harmanpreet Singh have been named the Asian Player of the Year 2016 in the senior men's category and the Asian Promising Player of the Year 2016 in the junior men's category, respectively, by the Asian Hockey Federation (AHF).

The nominations for these awards were made by coaches across Asia from the national teams in Asia and the criteria of nomination was based on the performance of the year 2016.

SV Sunil played a vital role in team India's successful outing at FIH Champions Trophy in London last year where he led the forwardline and was instrumental in the team's historic Silver medal winning performance. Considered to be one of the fastest men on the pitch in the world, Sunil has also served as the team's Vice-Captain and is entrusted with the duty of leading by example.

Harmanpreet Singh had a stupendous 2016 with the Indian junior men's team winning the Uttar Pradesh Hockey Junior World Cup Men Lucknow 2016 where he led the team's defence and was instrumental in converting penalty corners. He was also part of the Indian men's team at the 2016 Rio Olympics and the FIH Champions Trophy in London where the Indian team won a historic Silver medal.

Since Harmanpreet Singh and SV Sunil are currently training at the national camp in SAI, Bengaluru, the awards were received by Tapan Das, Treasurer and Mohd Mushtaque Ahmad, Secretary General, Hockey India respectively at Muscat.

Hockey India President Mariamma Koshy congratulated the players for the coveted awards.

Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society's Secretary General Shri Kukoo Walia also conveyed his greetings to both the Indian players on their achievements and wished them good luck in their future assignments.

Some of the main objectives of AIU in the field of sports include: to establish and maintain a sports organisation for promoting sports among Member-Universities; to act as a liaison between the universities and the Government (Central as well as the State Governments) and to co-operate with other universities or bodies (national or international) in matters of common interest; to serve as an Inter-University Organisation, to act as a bureau of information and to facilitate communication.

AIU draws up dates for Zonal Inter University Tournaments, Award of Maulana Abul Kalam

Azad (MAKA) Trophy, distribution of Certificates of Merit to Sportspersons/ Teams Securing First Three Positions in All India/ Inter Zonal University Games, etc. AIU organises National University Games in different disciplines at various centres every year and gives away certificates and prizes to participants and winners.

A I U a I s o h e I p s m a n y s p o r t s federations/associations conduct their tournaments in a proper manner. AIU has been a source of great encouragement to Nehru Hockey Society to conduct its annual All India University hockey tournaments successfully.

The Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society has associate itself with AIU in conducting the annual All India Universities Hockey Tournament, as in previous years. AIU feels that the collaboration with JNHTS would prove to be the best platform for successfully implementing its hockey promotion programme as both have the same vision and objectives.

Having been a former University star hockey player and one of the finest sports administrators in the country, Shri Kukoo Walia values the importance of University sports in general and hockey in particular. The city has produced a string of hockey stalwarts since then. Indian women's hockey star Eliza Nelson hails from the city. A Padma Shri and Arjuna Award recipient, Nelson was the captain of the Indian women's team that won the gold medal in the 1982 Asian Games and finished fourth in the 1980 Olympics. Hockey icon Dhanraj Pillay also polished his skills in Khadki and led India to the Asian Games gold medal in 1998 after a hiatus of 32 years. Another Pune-ite and hockey midfielder Vikram Pillay represented India in the 2004 Athens Olympics.

One hopes Dr Bhonsale's pioneering initiative will inspire young talent to bloom and win medals for Indian hockey at the Olympic Games.

TRIBUTE TO A LEGEND

Nehru Hockey Society condoles the demise of Sardar Balbir Singh Senior



An era came to an end on the morning of May 25, 2020. Legendary hockey player, Sardar Balbir Singh Dosanjh (popularly known as 'Balbir Singh Senior' in sports fraternity) breathed his last at a Chandigarh hospital.

A member of the Indian hockey team which won three consecutive titles at the Olympic Games from 1948-1956, and silver medal at the 1958 Asian Games, Shri Balbir Singh Dosanjh Ji will forever be remembered as the catalyst of Indian sports' first major victory after Independence, when he scored a brace in the final against Great Britain in the London 1948 Olympics.

A 'Great Son of India', the country's sporting hero, champion hockey spearhead, mentor and manager of the 1975 World Cup-winning Indian team, administrator in

1975 World Cup-winning Indian team, administrator in Punjab Sports, and a Senior Member of the Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society, Shri Balbir Singh Dosanjh's contribution to hockey will be written in golden letters.

Born to Sardar Dalip Singh Dosanjh and Sardarni Karam Kaur at Haripur Khalsa (Punjab) on October 10, 1924, Shri Balbir Singh Dosanjh's end came at Chandigarh on May 25, 2020. His daughter Sushbir Bhomia Ji and grandson Kabir Singh were at his bedside during his final moment.

BREAKING NEWS

Olympics: some known and unknown facts

- Field hockey was introduced at the Summer Olympic Games as a men to competition at the 1908 Games in London, with six teams, including four from the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.
- In the Olympic hockey event in 1932, India won the final by defeating USA 23-1. It was a world record for a long time. Among the 23 goals, hockey wizard Dhyan Chand scored eight.
- In the final match of Berlin Olympics, Dhyan Chand played half of the match barefooted to increase his speed. India won the match 8-1.
- THE 2012 Olympics in London was played over 17 days. Do you think it is too long?? It's nothing compared to the first Summer Olympics staged in London in 1908, which spanned 188 days, or more than half of the year. Although the formal opening ceremonies were not until July 13, the 1908 Games opened on April 27 with the racquets competition and ended October 31 with the field hockey final.
- The 1900 Paris Games spanned more than five months, and the 1904 St. Louis Games and the 1920 Antwerp Games also lasted nearly as long.
- Spain has appeared in the most Olympic men's competitions without winning the men's gold medal, having won silver three times in 1980, 1996, 2008 and bronze once in 1960.
- Olympic field hockey games were first played on artificial turf at the 1976 Montreal Olympic Games.
- Until 1988 Olympics the tournament was invitational but FIH introduced qualification system since the 1992 games.
- In the 2012 London Olympics, Field Hockey was the 3rd most watched sport. Field Hockey has the fastest speed of swing, even more than golf and baseball.
- Field Hockey is played by over a 3, 000, 000 players spread over 100 countries and 5 continents.
- Along with Soccer and Cricket, Field Hockey is the 3rd most watched sport of the world.



THE BIRTH OF THE ASIAN GAMES

The Asian Games movement has creditably acquired the status of the most prestigious event in the Continent's sports character. The moving spirit behind the concept of the Asian Games Federation was Prof. Guru Dutt Sondhi, a sports academic of Lahore fame, whose life was dedicated to the promotion of sports and spreading the Olympic movement far and wide in this Continent. He was variously a Member of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and President of the Amateur Athletic Federation of India (AAFI). He was primarily responsible for the founding of the Western Asiatic Games in the 30's which was last held in 1934 after which the worsening international geo-political situation prevented its continuation. But the war years did not dampen his zeal for sports, the promotion of which was a passion with him.

Around this time the Far Eastern Games also used to be held in which China, Japan and the Philippines were regular participants. Asian countries were thus taking increasing interest in Olympic Games.

All these gave rise to the concept of an all Asian Games to bring the youth of Asia together in the area of sports. The idea which originated in the mind of Prof. Sondhi lay dormant until March 1947 when the Asian Relations Conference, called by Jawaharlal Nehru in New Delhi, brought an opportunity to air before the countries attending the Conference the proposal of an Asian Games. Prof. Sondhi tactfully put his idea to Mr Nehru reportedly on the second day of the Conference. Idealist Nehru not only took immediate opportunity to bless the idea, he even made it a main topic in informal gatherings with friends at the Conference where it received a strong support from the leaders present. Then during the London Olympics in 1948, the plan was again put before a gathering of Asian representatives. It was accepted unanimously.

A draft constitution was then prepared by a sub-committee consisting of representatives from India, China, South Korea and the Philippines. The draft constitution was finally approved and adopted at the next session held in Delhi. The final document was signed by representatives of Afghanistan, Burma, India, Pakistan and the Philippines. The Lahore Professor's brain-child thus came into being amidst fanfare at the Patiala House in New Delhi on February 13, 1949. The Far Eastern Games, which started in 1913 at Manila was then transformed into the "Asian Games Federation" (AGF). The historic occasion also witnessed the adoption of the Asian Games motto: "EVER ONWARD... ONE SPIRIT RULES THE GAMES".

However, the euphoria did not last long: India's brain-child AGF was sacrificed in order to give birth to a new set-up to be known as "Olympic Council of Asia" (OCA). It was said that this new body would further broad-base the activities of the Asian Games movement and also thwart the participation of any unwanted country in Asian Sports, as per an unanimous decision of the 26 members present in an AGF's General Assembly held in Delhi's Ashoka Hotel Room on November 27,1981. The OCA thus came into existence on December 6, 1982, exactly two days after the ninth Asian Games in Delhi, when the AGF Council met in Delhi for the last time under the Chairmanship of the then IOA Chief, the late Raja Bhalendra Singh.

Since the 10th Asiad at Seoul (1986) the Asian Games are being held regularly under the auspices of the OCA with more and more disciplines being added. This goes against the AGF Charter, which stipulated only eight disciplines - two compulsory (athletics and swimming) and six others being optional. Obviously the idea was to help the developing countries in the Continent to keep themselves within their limited budget.

Disappointed with the bronze medal-finish at the 16th Asian Games in Guangzhou (China), India's ace drag-flicker Sandeep Singh said the team was the best in the quadrennial event but lack of video referral system deprived the men's team of a well-deserved victory against Malaysia in the semi-final. The sins vp India's performance at the Games.

India had earlier defeated arc-rivals Pakistan in the league phase and beat defending champions and four-time winners Korea in the bronze medal play-off. The Raipal Singh-led Indian men's team lost to Malaysia through Muhammad Amin Rahim's golden goal in the semi-final despite leading 3-2 till the 67th minute.

Former Indian skipper Sandeep Singh, who scored the highest number of goals (11) in the tournament, echoed chief coach Jose Brasa's sentiments in condemning the standard of umpiring in the tournament.

Indian men topped Pool B after winning all their four opponents. They beat Hong Kong 7-0, whipped Bangladesh 9-0, edged past Pakistan 3-2 and scored an identical 3-2 win over Japan. India's win over Pakistan once again emphasized the team's domination over the arch-rivals in recent tournaments. India won a battle of wits that mirrored a tactical approach and was laced in a good measure of technical excellence.

Pool A witnessed Korea and Malaysia emerge on top with 10 points each. The two played out a 2-2 draw in the league.

India's win over Pakistan had given the Indian players the much-needed boost and the confidence to make to the final. But Malaysia, to whom India had never lost in previous Asian Games, proved a thorn and ousted the Indians in the semi-final. Prodigal India thus crashed out to the spirited Malaysians. Despite getting chances aplenty in the second half, the Indian forwards were found lacking the killer punch.

The controversial penalty-corner awarded to Malaysia in the 49th minute, which television replays showed was an error of judgment on the part of Australian umpire A Kearns, brought Malaysia at par 22-2 Bad luck struck India with Sandeep Singh leaving the field with an injury.

It was Malaysia's maiden entry into the final, Malaysia had earlier shared honours with Korea. Despite being faster, fitter, fluent and exercising control over the match early on, the Koreans found the Malaysians giving nothing away.

To rub salt into India's wounds, Pakistan made it to the final after 20 years, beating South Korea 4-3 via penalty strokes. Korea's search for the third gold in a row ended on an agonizing note as Pakistan note as Pakistan dethroned the defending champions in the sudden death.

Pakistan won the Asian Games gold medal beating Malaysia 2-0 in the final while India had to be satisfied with the bronze medal after crushing defending champion Korea's attempt to win the gold medal for the fifth time. Having missed out a podium finish at Doha, it was a consolation for the Indian men to have finished third here.

Happy days are here again

The magic moment that the Indian hockey had been waiting for a long time finally arrived at the Seonhak Stadium in Incheon when the men's team defeated arch-rivals Pakistan to wear the cherished gold for the third time in coveted Asian Games.

The victory has laid to rest the ghosts of the 1982 Asiad in Delhi where the home team was whipped 1-7 by Pakistan.

The much anticipated grand final of the 17th Asian Games men's hockey competition was another instance of the age-old rivalry between subcontinent neighbours. In an encounter absolutely worthy of being the crowning conclusion of the competition, India took sweet revenge for the defeat they suffered against Pakistan in the pool match a few days earlier.

Big money in the Hockey India League has rejuvenated players and there is a semblance of professionalism in the working style of the national federation. Hockey is clearly on the road to redemption in India, though an Olympic medal is still a pipe dream and a lot of work remains at grassroots level.

The gold medal at Incheon was India's first Asian Games title since Bangkok 1998. Pakistan will have to hope for their other avenue of qualification, through next year's Hockey World League semi-finals.

In a thrilling end-to-end contest that concluded 1-1 after the regulation time, goalkeeper PR Sreejesh emerged as the hero pulling off two brilliant saves. Sreejesh has been one of the standout performers for India over the last year or so. Dharamvir Singh did well under pressure in converting the final attempt as India scored a 4-2 penalty shoot-out victory. The Sardar Singh-led team richly deserves the nation's congratulations.

India was placed in Group B along with Pakistan, China, Oman and Sri Lanka. India began the campaign with a 8-0 win over Sri Lanka, Rupinder getting three goals. It was followed by 7-0 win over Oman in which Rupinder and Raghunath netted two goals each. Then came the toughest match of the group, against Pakistan, who had come into the tournament having had very few international exposure games in the last one year. Yet, India failed to measure up to expectations and lost 1-2. India finished its league encounters with a 2-0 win over China and ended second in the table with nine points while Pakistan topped with 12 points.

The semi-final saw India pip hosts South Korea by a solitary goal scored by Akashdeep and make it to the summit clash with Pakistan. And as they say, rest is history.

Bronze medalists at the last Asian Games in Doha, the Indian Women's Hockey team finished a disappointing fourth at the Game's 16th edition at Guangzhou (China) after going down to Japan by a solitary goal via golden goal in the bronze medal play-off at the Aoti Hockey field.

The Indian team was done in by Kuko Manabi's 78th minute golden goal. Japan thus managed to avert ignominy of finishing out of the medal bracket. It was a clean slate for Japan against India whom they had crushed 3-0 in the league stage earlier.

India were undone by some poor trappings and sloppy defence work as they conceded as many as 10 penalty corners to the Japan team, who managed to convert just one of them.

There was no proper co-ordination between the Indian midfielders and their forward line. But for some neat work under the bar by Dipika Murty, the margin of defeat could have been bigger. The Indians survived intense pressure exerted through quite a few raids. India frittered away a few chances. It was a sweet revenge against India for the Japanese who had lost to the same opponents in the last World Cup in Rosario.

Indian coach Sandeep Somesh conceded that the team missed the link against Korea in the league stage and had struggled to recover since then. Prior to the start of the Games, Samesh had said that Malaysia, Japan and Korea would decide where the Indian team finished.

The Indians went down fighting to Korea by a solitary goal but overwhelmed Thailand by a thumping 13-0 margin in the seven-team league phase. India beat Kazakhstan 6-0 and Malaysia 4-0 but lost to Korea and Japan to finish with nine points. China and Korea were level on 16 points while Japan had 12 to their credit.

China emerged as the champions and completed a hat-trick of triumphs in the women's hockey competition since 2002. In an absorbing final, the host won on penalty strokes, converting all five against Korea's four for a final score of 5-4.

Malaysia beat Thailand 3-0 to end fifth.

Sweet Revenge for India Women

The Indian women's hockey teams took a sweet revenge against the Japanese side in the 17th Asian Games as they defeated them 2-1. With this win, they not only won the bronze medal match but also avenged their last Asiad defeat in 2010 Guangzhou Games when they had lost to the same opponents in the bronze medal match.

Japan had defeated them in extra time in Guangzhou but in Incheon, the 13th ranked Indian girls kept the match well in control right throughout against 10th ranked Japan. This is the third bronze medal won by the women's team. The Indian women had won gold in the 1982 Games in-New Delhi. They were runners-up in 1998 at Bangkok and were placed fourth in Beijing (1990), Hiroshima (1994), Busan (2002) and Guangzhun (2010).

Team's chief coach Neil Hawgood felt his wards deserved a better "colour of the medal" going by their performance in the Continental extravaganza. The Australian said had it not been for a few mistakes in two games - against China and South Korea in the semi-final - India could have finished at higher podium position. India conceded a late goal to go down 1-2 against China in the pool stages before slumping to a 1-3 defeat against hosts South Korea in the semi-final in spite of being the better side on the turf. Having failed to secure a direct berth in 2016 Rio Olympics unlike their male counterparts, the Indian eves will now have to do a lot of hard work to come out with flying colours in the Rio Games qualifiers.

Placed in Group A, Indian women began with a 3-0 win over Thailand before going down 1-2 to China. India then whipped Malaysia 6-1 with Poonam Rani and Jaspreet Kaur getting two goals each. Jaspreet Kaur was excellent in her penalty corner executions while Namita Toppo displayed a fine sense of timing. India finished their league engagements with six points as against China who topped with nine. Indians put up stiff resistance against South Korea in the semi-final before going down 1-3. In the hard-fought battle between the two teams for Bronze Medal, India took an early lead through a successful conversion of a penalty corner by Jaspreet Kaur in the 23rd minute, following a dry first quarter.

Japan squeezed off its first goal which came through the stick of Shibata Akane in the 41st minute. India's craving for scoring more goals did not come to an end as Vandana Katariya answered beautifully to the opponents in the very next minute giving a simple finish after being beautifully set up by Rani Rampal in the 42nd minute. South Korea beat defending champions China in the final for its first Asian Games gold since 1998.

INDIA IN THE ASIA CUP (MEN)

The idea to have a Tournament of Asian countries was conceived by late A.I.S. Dara, then President of the Asian Hockey Federation. In his words, giving the background, late Mr. Dara said "When on one occasion, no less a person than President FIH himself said that why do you talk of Asia when hardly 7 out of 19 countries played Hockey. This he said, was most embarrassing and than I proposed to have a tournament of the Asian countries, and this is how the proposal of Asia Cup originated." A formal decision was taken to start this tournament in the meeting of the AHF held in Karachi on 12th January, 1980.

Originally the Asia Cup Tournament was to be held in its preliminaries with countries divided in Eastern Group, South Eastern Group and Western Group. The two qualifiers of each group along with the Asian Games finalists, Pakistan and India were to play in the final round.

Due to various reasons, the scheme of qualifying rounds did not mature. Dr. M.A.M. Ramaswamy then President of Indian Hockey Federation donated the Asia Cup Trophy for the inaugural tournament held at Karachi from 12-20 March, 1982. By then, the founder of the Tournament, Mr. Dara had died and the inaugural Tournament was in Memory to late A.I.S. Dara, the Tournament was honoured by the presence of late Mr. R.G. Frank, President FIH as a tribute to the memory of that great figure, A.I.S. Dara.

The Asia Cup Trophy donated by Dr. M.A.M. Ramaswamy at the inaugural tournament was damaged and it was decided that anew Trophy be instituted. His Majesty Sultan Azlan Shah, President Asian Hockey Federation, kindly agreed to donate a very beautiful and valuable Trophy. The A.H.F. Executive Committee, on 8th September, 1984, at Kula Lumpur Thankfully accepted the donation from President A.H.F.




Born at Allahabad on August 29,1905. Dhyan Chand is the Greatest centre forward the game has ever known. He joined the Army in 1922, and was given the King's Commission in 1943. He retired from the Army as a major. As a member of the Indian Army team he toured New Zealand in 1926, and thereafter was an automatic choice for the Indian team which made its debut in 1928 Olympics Games at Amsterdam, his fabulous performance in the Olympics earned him the title of Wizard'. He again led India's attack in the 1932 Los Angeles Olympic Games and four years later was honoured to lead his country in the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin. His last appearance In representative hockey was in 1947-48, when he led the I.H.F. team in East Africa. He was awarded PADMA BHUSHAN' in the year 1956. He breathed his last on 3.12.1979 at Delhi.







London Olympics 2012

A dream shattered yet again

Indian team's worst show at London Olympics but lets be positive and learn from mistakes, Indian men's hockey team touched a new low by finishing at the bottom of the competition after being beaten 3-2 by South Africa in the 11-12 place classification match at the London Olympic Games. The bottom-place finish will leave lingering pain for Indian hockey. This was the sixth straight loss at the Riverbank Arena for the Indian team, who made a return to the Olympics after failing to qualify for the 2008 Games in Beijing. The previous lowest position that the country had occupied was eighth at the 1996 Atlanta Games.


London presented an opportunity for the Indian team to find its lost glory. It was redemption time, it marked India's return to the Games after eight years. After humiliating loss, the big question is about the Indian team's preparedness for the Olympics. The Indian team showed a distinct lack of preparedness for the big event, India's No. 10 International ranking itself was a clear indication that they were never in medal contention but it was hard to believe that they would fail to win a single match. The fact that eight-time gold medalists India had not even entered the hockey semi-finals for 32 years underscores the marginality of India in a sport in which they once were world beaters, it was a sad commentary on Indian hockey when Chief Coach Michael Nobbs said that some players seemed satisfied at having become Olympians, while a few others were striving to give their best for the country.

We prove time and again that, as a nation, we overreact on winning and losing. The need of the hour is to address the root causes. Schools and colleges should give more importance to sports — at least provide a proper playground. Talent should be spotted at a young age and encouraged, if we are honest about these, India will find itself competing with others sooner than later. The Bharat Chetri-led team got all the support from the Hockey India, Government, and Corporates in preparation for the London Olympic. That is the reason one is disappointed at the dismal show put up by the team.

The Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society's motto has always been to inspire and promote the game and its players from grass-roots level. Society's Secretary Shri Kukoo Walia believes that heaven has not fallen. What the immediate need is that all the authorities concerned should draw a plan immediately to rectify past mistakes and prepare for the next Olympics in earnest. Rome was not built in a day. We must accept the fact that while other nations have moved far ahead we have fallen behind. But there is still hope and light at the end of the tunnel.





RIO OLYMPICS (2016)

MEN'S TEAM FRITTER AWAY CHANCES, FINISH 8TH

The Indian men's team finished eighth in the Rio Olympics after losing 1-3 to Belgium in the quarter-finals, which they had reached after an agonizing gap of 36 long years.

The new format for the Olympic Hockey Competition did not have play offs and teams were given positions based on matches won and goals scored in the league phase. Accordingly, among the quarter-final losers, Spain finished fifth, Australia 6th, New Zealand 7th, Indian 8th, Great Britain 9th, Ireland 10th, Canada 11th and hosts Brazil at the bottom on 12th position.Indian men's hockey team secured their Rio 2016 Olympic berth with a gold medal at the 2014 Asian Games in Incheon. But with 11 Olympic medals in their name, India failed to repeat the golden run at the biggest sporting extravaganza.

PR Sreejesh led 16 member squad had a fine blend of experience and youth in its ranks and was expected to do much better than its London show where it finished 12th and last four years ago. However, the Indian team's perennial weakness of going defensive after taking an early lead and then conceding goals in the dying seconds once again proved the team's disaster at the Olympic Hockey Centre in Dedoro (Rio-de-Janeiro), Brazil. The Indian defence also fumbled at crucial moments to provide the opposion goal-scoring opportunities. Eight-time Champions India also wasted several penalty-corners, especially the five they frittered away seconds from the final hooter in the game against the Netherlands will haunt them for long.

India were placed with Argentina, Canada, Germany, Ireland and the Netherlands in Pool-B.

Pool Match - India vs Ireland: India took on Ireland in their first match in Pool B. This was Ireland's first Olympic appearance since 1908 when they had earned a silver medal. Indians had defeated Ireland in a sixnation tournament in Velencia (Spain) in June. Penalty corner specialist Rupinder Pal Singh scored a brace as India began their campaign in the Rio Olympics with a morale boosting 3-2 win against Ireland. Dragflicker V.R. Raghunath scored India's opener in the 15th minite, while Rupinder doubled the lead in the 27th minute. John Jermyn (45th) pulled one back for Ireland but Rupinder delighted the Indians with another successful penalty corner conversion. Later, Conor Harte (55th) brought Ireland into contention but India saw off late nervous moments before winning 3-2.

India vs Germany: Indian men's hockey team's perennial habit of conceding late goals continued to haunt them as reigning double Olympic champions Germany scored seconds from the final hooter to steal a 2-1 win in a thrilling Pool B match. Despite playing near perfect hockey for the major part of the match the Germans stole the win with just 3.1 seconds from full time. After weathering India's attacking onslaught for the majority of the game, the Germans exerted tremendous pressure on the Indian defence in the final two minutes.

India vs Argentina: India survived a final-quarter onslaught from Argentina for a nail-biting 2-1 win.

India dominated Argentina in the first three quarters but came under tremendous pressure from the Los Leones in the final 15 minutes during which they conceded as many as five penalty corners. India were the better side in the first three quarters and took the lead through Chinglensana Singh (8th minute) before fellow Manipuri player Kothajit Singh doubled the scoreline with a field strike in the 35th minute.

Trailing 0-2, the Argentines played all out hockey in the final quarter as the Indians looked out of sorts. It was a tense final quarter for the Indians after drag-flicker Gonzalo Peillat pulled one back for Argentina in the 49th minute by converting their first penalty corner with a lethal strike that beat goalkeeper PR Sreejesh all ends up.

The final quarter completely belonged to Argentina but the Indians did just enough to maintain their composure and avoided repeat of the match against Germany.

Match 4: **India vs Netherlands:** India wasted as many as five penalty-corners seconds from the final hooter and went down 1-2 to reigning silver medallists the Netherlands. The Netherlands scored both their goals from penalty-corners, through Rogier Hoffman (32nd minute) and Mink van der Weerden (54th), while India's lone goal came from the stick of V R Raghunath (38th). India had a chance to snatch a point from the match as the match witnessed intense drama in the final seconds, but they failed to score from five successive penalty-corners.

Match 5: India vs Canada: India were held 2-2 by lower-ranked Canada in its final group phase game that failed to guarantee it a third place in the Pool B.

Already assured of a place in the quarter-finals, India played an attacking game but had to wait for 33 minutes to break the deadlock. Akashdeep Singh made it 1-0 for India after scoring on a penalty corner rebound. But world No.15 Canada took few second to make it 1-1 with a successful penalty corner conversion from captain Scott Tupper. Ramandeep Singh deflected a ball in near the right post from a long slap from VR Raghunath to make it 2-1 for India in the 41st minute. Tupper brought Canada on level with a successful penalty corner conversion in the 52nd minute.

QF: India vs Belgium: India, ranked 5th in FIH World Rankings, blew away a great opportunity to create history after a hiatus of 36 years to climb the medal podium. A lacklustre India squandered a one goal advantage to go down 1-3 to Belgium and crashed out of the men's hockey competition.

India took the lead through a fine field effort from Akashdeep Singh (15th minute) before Belgium pumped in three field goals from Sebastien Dockier (34th, 45th) and Tom Boon (50th) to dash India's hopes of their first medal after the gold in 1980 at Moscow.

Belgium scripted history as they progressed to the semi-finals of the Olympics after a gap of 96 years.

Two successive Olympic gold medal winners Germany were shown the exit by Argentina 5-2 in the semi-final. The other semi-final saw Belgium beat Netherlands 2-1. Netherlands were champions in 1996 and 2000 and silver medallists in 2012.

GOLD MEDAL MATCH: Argentina won their maiden Olympic men's hockey gold with a 4-2 victory over Belgium, thanks to a 10-minute goal blitz in the first half. Belgium, also playing their first final, had taken the lead after just three minutes. But the South Americans hit back scoring three goals in the first half.

Germany claimed the bronze medal beating The Netherlands 4-3 via shoot-out after the teams were tied 1-1 at the end of regulation time.

RIO OLYMPICS (2016)

INDIAN WOMEN DISAPPOINT, FINISH LAST

The Indian Women's Hockey team had qualified for the Rio Olympics after 36 years. They last played at the 1980 Moscow Games the same year the men's team won their last gold medal. The women finished fourth in the competition back then. Over the years, the team's showing at international and multi-sport events had improved considerably. The team finished in the top at the 2014-15 Women's FIH Hockey World League Semi-finals to seal their Rio berth and stunned Japan 2-1 to win the bronze medal at the 2014 Asian Games.

Indian women, 13th in the FIH World Rankings, were drawn in pool-B along with Argentina, USA, Great Britain, Australia and Japan.

Game 1 - India vs Japan: The resilient Indians showed tremendous fighting spirit and came from two goals down to eke out a 2-2 draw against higher ranked Japan (No.10) in their opening match. Indians trailed by two goals at half-time after Japan scored through Emi Nishikori (15th and Mie Nakashima (28th). Indians made a valliant fightback as Rani Rampal (31st) and Milima Minz (40th) scored a goal each in the third and fourth quarters to secure one point for the team.

Indian women were outplayed 0-3 by higher ranked Great Britain in its second match. The difference in class and quality between the two teams was clearly on display as world No.7 Great Britain managed to find three goals within a space of eight minutes, through Giselle Ansley (25th minute), Nicola White (27th) and Alexandra Danson (33rd).

India found the going tough against Britain from the start, Britain attacked with regularly and introduced the Indian circle with using both the flanks to the maximum. However, India's defence managed to keep the goals away in the first quarter and in the second quarter too, the story didn't change. But the scoreline did.

India vs Australia: Indian team dished out a disappointing performance to suffer a 1-6 defeat at the hands of a rampaging Australia. The Australians exposed the defensive frailties of the Indians. Jodie Kenny (43,46), Kathryn Slattery (5th), Georgina Morgan (9th), Jane Claxton (35th) and Georgina Parker (36th) scored for the winners while Anuradha Thokchom scored with just 8.3 seconds left on the clock. The margin of defeat could have been bigger had goalkeeper Savita Punia not come up with some fine saves.

India got just one penalty corner which they failed to convert. Australia forced seven penalty corners from which they scored four times.

India vs USA: The Indian women's hockey team produced another lackluster performance as it was outplayed by United States of America 0-3 to slump to its third successive loss. The Indians were once again left to defend their citadel for most part of the match as the Americans dictated the pace.

The Indian defence crumbled in the final quarter as they ventured higher on the field in search of a goal but they were punished by the Americans on the counter. The Americans got three penalty corners in the final quarter and put the Indian defence under severe pressure but they could not add any more goal.

The fitter and faster Americans kept the possession with them for long periods of the match while the Indians gave away the ball easily to their opponents, who got nine penalty corners as against none by the Indians. The Americans, however, could not score a single goal from the penalty corner. All the three goals came from field efforts.

Kathleen Bam scored twice in the 14th and 42nd minutes while Melissa Gonzalez struck once in the 52nd minute.

Match 5: vs Argentina: The Indian women's hockey team suffered a humiliating 0-5 loss against higher-ranked Argentina in their final Pool B fixture to end their campaign at the Rio Olympics.

Martina Cavallero (16th minute, 29th), Maria Granatto (23rd), Carla Rebecchi (26th) and Agustina Albertarrio (27th) scored for Argentina.

Pitted against the London Games silver medallists, India cut a sorry figure as Argentina made a mockery of their defence, pumping in as many as five goals in the second quarter itself to dash any hope of a miracle.

GOLD MEDAL MATCH: Maddie Hinch produced the heroics once again as Great Britain completed to perfection, saving three times in a shoot-out to beat Netherlands 2-0 after normal time had ended 3-3. It ended the Dutch reign at the Olympics (they topped the podium at Beijing and London), denying them a three-in-a-row as Great Britain clinched its first ever title in the competition.

This was Britain's maiden gold in the competition in their maiden entry in the final, having won bronze four years ago in London.

Germany won the bronze medal defeating New Zealand 2-1.



MEN'S WORLD CUP

Hockey has been an International Sports since a very long time. It has been an important event in the Olympics since 1908. But as years went by a need was felt for having an exclusive world-level competition for hockey. The first move towards this was made in 1969. Accordingly, a joint appeal was made by India and Pakistan to the Council of the International Hockey Federation (F.I.H.) in Paris in March 30. This proposal was studied by a Commission of eight persons appointed by the Council. Seven months later on October 26, the Commission reported back to Council. A recommendation was made whereby a World Cup Tournament would be organised every two years.

After the unanimous acceptance of this proposal, the necessary qualification plan and regulation

were drafted by the Commission. And soon the Council and the Commission together decided to organise the first ever World Cup Tournament in 1971.

However, later, after having played two World Cup tournaments every two years, the F.I.H. decided to change the frequency of the tournament. On September 29, 1974, a decision was taken to hold the tournament at intervals of four years.

The design of the World Cup Trophy has been conceived and created by Pakistan. It was first thought of in the form of a hockey stick fabricated in gold and silver. But a better idea was evolved when Lt. Gen. Azhar Khan, former President of Pakistan Hockey Federation suggested another theme. And accordingly, Mr. Bashir Moojid, the designer, alongwith the most skilful artisans from the Pakistan army's Corps of Electrical & Mechanical Engineers designed and shaped it into the master–piece which every hockey playing nation covets. This trophy was then donated to the International Hockey Federation by



Pakistan. The format presentation was made at a brief ceremony in Brussels on March 27, 1971, when Mr. H.E. Masood, the Ambassador of Pakistan in Belgium handed over World Cup to Mr. Rene Frank, President of F.I.H.

The World Cup is a majestic gold and silver trophy mounted on a 120.85 mm high blade base, beautifully inlaid with ivory. The trophy itself, consists of a globe depicting the world in silver and gold on top of which is a ball and hockey stick, also in gold and silver.

At the base of the globe is a silver cup with intricate floral design.

REMEMBERING ASHWINI KUMAR THE BRILLIANT POLICE OFFICER AND GREAT SPORTS ADMINISTRATOR

While reading the history of Indian hockey, I noticed that 2020 was the birth centenary year of the late Ashwini Kumar, the outstanding Police Officer and internationally renowned sports administrator. Kumar had passed away in New Delhi on 19th October, 2015 nearly a month and a half before his 95th birthday. His second daughter Yamini, once my student and now a good friend confirmed that her father was born on 28th December, 1920. Seeing how keen I was to write a piece remembering the versatile genius her father, she provided me with all the necessary information.

Ashwini Kumar was a brilliant and great police officer, distinguished sports administrator and a connoisseur of music. He was a person with clear views and passionate about whatever he undertook. He was a great judge of talent and possessed great foresight. Most important of all, he was a great human who would go out of his way to help people in all possible ways. In his interview with me, Kumar said, "To be honest, I was among the first few people in the country who believed that players needed security and patronage. The great Balbir Singh (Sr) was recruited by me straight from the college. He started as a full back. But seeing his speed, his scoring ability and dash, I made him play at the centre forward position where he made a name for himself. Udham Singh, another great, was the other player of that time to be groomed by me. Ajitpal Singh was yet another fine player I spotted at the school level when he was 13 or 14 years old. I then recruited him at 18."

Ashwini Kumar was born in Jalandhar on 28th December, 1920 to a distinguished physician of pre-partitioned Lahore, Dr. Vishwa Nath. He was the fifth child of nine children (five brothers and four sisters). Ashwini Kumar did his Master's degree in History from the Government College, Lahore where he was also the Assistant Editor of the College magazine "Ravi". In his youth, Ashwini Kumar was a crack boxer, a fine hockey player, a good rower and a national-level athlete.

Kumar's police career began in 1942 when he joined the Imperial Police (I.P.) at the age of 22. The Service was a precursor to the present day Indian Police Service (IPS). In those days, only one Indian was selected for the IP in a year. All the other officers were British. The IP exam was conducted by the Federal Public Service Commission.

During his tenure in the police, Kumar cracked some of the toughest cases in Indian Police history like liquidating the notorious Bhupat gang in Saurashtra, where he had been hand-picked and sent from Punjab in 1951 and of course, apprehending the killers of Pratap Singh Kairon, a former Chief Minister of Punjab, after a dramatic chase to Nepal in the mid 1960s. After being DIG in the Punjab Police, Kumar's last posting was that of Director General (D.G.) BSF from 1st October, 1974 till 31st December, 1978 when he retired. The BSF Officers' Mess in Nizamuddin, New Delhi is named after him. Kumar had a glorious career of 36 years in the Police during which he successfully tackled difficult and hazardous law and order problems both interstate and at our country's borders. He also contributed articles on crime and terrorism.

His skills and expertise were also utilized by the IOC. Kumar supervised the security of six Olympics from 1980 (at Moscow). For his work as Security Delegate to the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, Kumar was awarded the Royal Spanish Medal one of the highest civilian decorations in Spain by the King of Spain. In 2000, he was adjudged 'Policeman of the Millennium' in Sydney for his work relating to Olympic Security.

Kumar had the distinction of being decorated for both gallantry and distinguished service. He was awarded the President's Medal for Gallantry twice, the President's Medal for Distinguished Service and the Police Medal for Meritorious Service. The Government of India honoured him with the Padma Bhushan in 1972.

Ashwini Kumar was very good at and extremely fond of Urdu Poetry and Music in general. He was the President of the very well-known Harballabh Music Festival of India which is annually held in Jalandhar. Old and new masters religiously participated in it. Kumar had even written a book on Indian Classical Music 'Casual Symphony'.

The super cop was also involved in the administration of different sports in India - Hockey, Basketball and Athletics and the Olympic movement both in India and abroad. However, it was his association with Hockey and the Olympic movement which brought him international fame.

In hockey, he became President of the Indian Hockey Federation in 1958 after serving for two years as Vice-President. He remained President of the then IHF till 1973-74 when he resigned. For most of his tenure as President of the Indian Hockey Federation, Ashwini Kumar served as Vice President of the International Hockey Federation (FIH). He headed the Indian Hockey delegation for the 1964 and 1968 Olympics. During his tenure as President of the Indian Hockey Federation, India regained the Olympic and Asian Games hockey titles in 1964 and 1966 respectively. During his tenure, India always won a medal. For all his good work in hockey, Kumar was awarded the Order of Merit of the International Hockey Federation (FIH) in 1982.

Ashwini Kumar also did great work for the Indian Olympic Association (IOA). He was Secretary General of the Indian Olympic Association for two terms: 1956-60 and 1970-74. He was finally made Life President of the Indian Olympic Association. It was after becoming a part of the International Olympic Committee in 1973 that Ashwini Kumar not only contributed to the cause of the Olympic movement but also helped the Organization to succeed in difficult situations. In addition to reaching high positions in the IOC, Kumar served as a member of many IOC Committees/Commissions. He was also honoured by the IOC and other member nations for his contribution to the Olympic Movement and Sports.

During his association with the IOC, Ashwini Kumar served as a member of IOC Commissions such as Olympic Solidarity (1980-84). Olympic Movement (1983-87 and 1992-96), Mass Media (1983-89), Radio (1983-87), Council of the Olympic Order (1983-87) and Preparation of the XII Olympic Congress Congress of Unity (1985-87). He was a Member of the Executive Board of the IOC in 1980-87 and 1992-96 and Vice President of the IOC in 1983-87 (the first from India and the first from Asia, Africa or Latin America to achieve this distinction). In 1994, Kumar won the prestigious IOC's Centenary Award in recognition of his services to Sports. After 27 years of dedicated and valuable service to the IOC, Ashwini Kumar was made an Honorary Member of the IOC in 2000. He received the Olympic Order of Merit in 2002 at the IOC's 104th Congress in Mexico City. In December 2012, when India was suspended from the Sochi Winter Olympics due to election of corruption tainted officials, it was mainly due to Ashwini Kumar's efforts, good name and convincing skills that the ban was lifted during the 2012 Sochi Winter Games.

Ashwini Kumar, who was also honoured by other countries for his great work relating to the Olympic Movement, has had the distinction of witnessing and being part of all Summer Olympics from 1948 London till 2012 London 17 Olympics in all. He was also regularly invited to the Winter Olympics. In September 1990, he was specially honoured by the Olympic Council of Asia with the prestigious Order of Merit for the development and promotion of Sports in Asia. Again in 1996, he was specially awarded a Sports Distinction Medal by the Brazilian Government. Finally, the following year, Kumar was awarded the Medal of Merit on behalf of the National Association of Olympic Committees of the World.

Ashwini Kumar was an extremely busy person because of his official, sports and social responsibilities. Despite their very busy schedules, his wife Renu, the niece of G.D. Sondhi the first IOC member from India, and Kumar himself, ensured that their two daughters Rohini, nicknamed Hockey (due to Kumar's passion for the sport) and Yamini, fondly referred to as Chotti as she is the younger one, were educated in the true sense. Both are happily married. Yamini, who joined the International Fair-Play Committee which works under the aegis of the International Olympic Committee and UN in 2019, does a lot of social work which involves helping less privileged children of the society in every possible way.

Is Hockey 5's Future of hockey?

In 2018, India took part in the Youth Olympic Games which sported the Hockey 5's format. Having refrained from participating in two previous editions after hockey was included in the 2010 Youth Olympics Games (YOG), it was a notable development in the annals of Indian hockey.

On show in the inaugural edition was the eleven-a-side format. In 2014, the novel five-a-side format was introduced. The Netherlands won the gold medal in 2010, China in 2014. The Indian girls qualified for the 2018 Youth Olympic Games, Buenos Aires, in October 2018. They went on to win silver, losing 1-3 to the hosts Argentina in the final. The girls had qualified for the Buenos Aires YOG after winning silver at the Asian YOG Qualifier (April 2018, Bangkok).

A newly created turf facility at Agra, Uttar Pradesh, held the camp for the Asian YOG Qualifier. At Bangkok, India went down to 1-4 China in the final but qualified for the Buenos Aires event. At Bangkok and Buenos Aires, the Indian girls were ably led by the brilliant all-rounder from Jharkhand, Salima Tete.

It was a strange but spectacular sight at Queen Srikrit stadium in Bangkok, a venue with which this writer was familiar, having covered 2009 Asia Cup etc.

But on this day the stadium appeared different. It was beautifully bedecked. The regulation sized pitch was now divided into two equal halves in which men and women's matches were played simultaneously. The team benches placed in a line across the turf. They separated the men's and women's courts. The playing area was surrounded by wooden boards. Officiating umpires stood outside those boards.

The Hockey 5's pitch did not have a striking circle. There weren't penalty corners. Goals could be scored from centre line onwards. Matches are of 20 minutes duration. Holding on to the ball or dribbling would consume precious time. Instead, players would do well to jab, flick and shoot at goal. The sideboards work out to be the sixth teammate. Players could use them to rebound the ball off the sideboards to a waiting teammate.

The game appeared robotic. Perfect, precise and so quick. One couldn't take one's eyes away from the action. The ball moved around fast. Too fast sometimes for umpires and the bench who were sent scurrying for cover as the ball whistled past them into the stands!

A squash-like enclosure would be ideal at these Five's encounters insofar as safety of officials and spectators is concerned, one thought!

Hockey 5's is touted as the future of hockey.

Many of us are traditionalists, would not like this kind of hockey where its brute force, not artistic or clever moves, will decide the outcome. Hockey has seen many mutational changes, some are questionable, not acceptable, but the character of the sports was largely determined by the changing times.

Hockey India, national sports governing body, seems to understand the changing mores and put on board Hockey 5s National Championship four years ago with limited team entries.

With increasing pressure on Olympic hosts to reduce costs and number of athletes, the 11-a-side format is feeling the heat, so as to say. It is also said that the Hockey 5s format is more spectator friendly and with less time of play but more goals will attract GenNext.

Whether Hockey 5s will be a game changer will be known only with times. As of now this format is under scrutiny.

The Dramatic 1971 Nehru Hockey final

Indian Airlines 2-0 victory against Great Britain in the 1971 Nehru hockey tournament final, with Inam-ur-Rehman scoring both goals is rated as a great triumph. Quality and skilful hockey was displayed by both teams. It was Indian Airlines first outright win in the Nehru hockey tournament. They had been joint winners with All India Police XI in 1968.

Also the trophy remained in India and Great Britain's giant killing spree was halted.

However the circumstances before the final match started were dramatic and full of suspense. The final was on a Saturday and days before war between India and Pakistan had started on both the Western and Eastern front. Pakistani fighter planes entered Indian territory and there were frequent air raid alarms.

Just before the match was due to start the loud siren of the air raid alarm went off. As spectators we ducked beneath our seats or took shelter in the corridors of Shivaji stadium. Both teams, which were warming up fled to the safety of their respective dressing rooms. It was doubtful if the match would take place.

Then Lt. General Harbaksh Singh came to the rescue. He was one of the guests for the final. He majestically marched to the centre of the field with his baton in his hand scanning the skies Next he phoned someone in the Army and got the all clear signal from them

He told the organisers that there was now no threat and the final could be played. Great Britain's players were reluctant but Harbaksh Singh persuaded them to play.

Some Indian Airlines players were also hesitant to play. However skipper Inam ur Rehman cajoled them and said the final was a matter of prestige as they could win the Nehru hockey tournament outright for the first time. Finally Ashok Kumar and BP Govinda relented. They realised it was also a matter of prestige for Indian hockey.

Indian Airlines had a star studded forward line, inside right Ashok Kumar, centre forward Govinda, inside left Inam and outside left crafty Shahid Noor. They attacked relentlessly but Great Britain's packed midfield and their goalkeeper made several daring saves. Penalty corners taken by defenders Tarlok Singh and Misbah were also saved.

Then minutes before half time Inam scored with individual brilliance. He exchanged passes with Ashok and entered the scoring circle using his famous lambi dribble, stick extended and ball glued to the stick. He feigned as if to shoot one way but then flicked in the opposite direction and Great Britain's goalkeeper was wrong footed. Inam's individual skills helped Indian Airlines lead 1-0 at halftime.

In the second half, Great Britain attacked relentlessly but Indian Airlines defence held firm. Prompted by Inam and Ashok's shrewd passes the speedy Shahid Noor and BP Govinda also troubled the Great Britain defence. It was vintage hockey, with end to end action. Deft stickwork and clever passing gave Indian Airlines the edge and they finally got the second goal.

Following a combined move, the ball came to Inam who befuddled the Great Britain defence with his dribbling skills and entered the striking circle and scored with a deceptive push that wrong footed the rival goalkeeper.

The packed crowd enjoyed this enthralling match but many did not stay for the prize giving ceremony as they were wary of further air raid sirens. For Indian Airlines it was the start of their dominant phase in Indian hockey. Inam later in life admitted that the 1971 Nehru hockey final was his finest match at the Shivaji stadium.

Is aggressive marketing devouring volunteerism in civilian sports?

"Throughout my career, I hardly played in a civilian team or in any civilian tournaments. My entire hockey, except in the Olympic Games, was confined to regimental tournaments. The Jhansi Heroes was the only civilian club, as far as I recollect, for whom I played in one or two big civilian tournaments.

"But then Jhansi Heroes was our home club, we founded and nursed it. Jhansi boys always looked forward to my annual leave, as it was during my holidays at Jhansi that I played a lot of hockey for the Jhansi Heroes. And many a youngster, who came into the first flight of Indian hockey at a later stage of life, learned his hockey, I should say, from me or the Jhansi Heroes, in our private matches at Jhansi and in and around Jhansi. Kishanlal, Mathura Prasad, Rup Singh, Ismail, Nanhey Lal, and many others played with us daily in practice matches at Jhansi," writes Hockey Wizard Major Dhyan Chand in the "Goal", probably the first-ever biography of an Indian hockey player.

This statement needs no elaboration to understand the state of hockey in pre-partition days. It tells all.

Change, they say, is the only thing that is permanent and Hockey or Hockey Tournaments are no different. Hockey has changed so have its tournaments.

Interestingly, a couple of tournaments in India Beighton Cup and Aga Khan Cup are credited for holding hockey competitions even before the sport was included in the Olympic games. Beighton Cup, considered one of the oldest, was started in Calcutta (now Kolkata) in 1895 and next year, Aga Khan held its first edition in Mumbai. Needless to emphasize these tournaments not only scripted the early history of Indian hockey but also cornered limelight even after India got its freedom in 1947, without ever getting their supremacy challenged by tournaments that emerged on the national and international horizon afterward.

Before I get to tracing history and growth of hockey tournaments in India, I would take this liberty of quoting Major Dhyan Chand about his experiences of playing in any civilian tournaments.

While talking about his participation in the Inter-Provincial Tournament in 1928, he says "The Army authorities gave me permission to play for the United Provinces and accordingly I arrived in Calcutta straight from my regiment to join the provincial team. I was a youngster and still belonged to the Other Ranks (Ors). I stayed in the camp along with the UP players most of whom, if not all, were strangers to me. N.N Mukherji, popularly known as Bulbul Mukherji, in the hockey world, was a member of the team.

"Five teams participated in the 1928 Inter-Provincial Hockey Tournament, which was staged with the sole idea of selecting India's first Olympic team. Imagine my surprise when I found Bombay, which was in those days, and is today, a big noise to hockey circles, being the home of Aga Khan Tourney did not think of cooperating in this national effort of the Indian Hockey Federation."

Those were the days when Inter-Provincial or National championships were important not only for deciding the champion team but also to watch all players in action before selecting the national team. Though after long gaps, National Championships, not one but many depending upon types of teams that participate, have been revived, they are without much of glamour as top players are invariably exempted from participating in them.

One of the things that have not changed even after 125 years of the start of hockey tournaments in India is negligible growth of Club culture in the country. Hockey is perhaps one of few games that have generally [L1] remained institutionalized with the Services, Police organizations, Railways, Banks and State-owned Petroleum Companies running the show.

When we look back, the only Club that showed up on the podium in the first five years of Beighton Hockey was Calcutta Rangers Club that won the trophy in 1899 and Major Dhyan Chand's Jhansi Heroes were the winners in 1933. In between Xaverian Club won the title in 1927. Bhopal Wanderers (1940), Calcutta Rangers Club (1941), Tata Sports Club (1949, 1950), before Calcutta's own Mohan Bagan became the champion in 1952. Interestingly, in 1941, Bhagwant Club shared honors as joint winners with the Bhopal Wanderers. Those who follow Rural Sports must be aware of Rural Olympics of Kila Raipur (unfortunately, this Rural Sports Festival has fallen a victim to politics) where the Bhagwant Gold Cup Hockey event used to be an attraction. The Bhagwant Gold Cup was donated by affluent Grewal community of Calcutta.

After Mohun Bagan, East Bengal also emerged on the Hockey Horizon by winning the Beighton Cup in 1962. Mohun Bagan and East Bengal are among the oldest Hockey Clubs in the country.

However, in Aga Khan Hockey Tournament which was started in 1896, Clubs held the sway as Bombay Gymkhana won the inaugural tournament followed by back to back title wins by Poona Volunteers in 1897 and 1898.

After Beighton and Aga Khan Cups, other important tournaments in pre-partition days included Calcutta Hockey League (1905), Lakshmibilash Cup (1909), Obaidullah Khan Cup (1933) and Bombay Hockey League (1946).

Players make Tournaments memorable

And these historic tournaments have their own stories to tell. Olympian Gurbux Singh, who was a dependable deep defender, gets nostalgic when he talks of hockey in Calcutta. He says he played in First Division Hockey for 40 years, including nine years for Calcutta Customs, 13 years for Mohun Bagan, and three years for East Bengal. Eleven times he was a member of the Beighton Cup champion team. He reveals that the oldest surviving Olympian Keshav Dutt became the first hockey player to be honored with the Bagan Rattan award. This year, it may be turn of Gurbux Singh to get this honor. Needless to say one cannot talk of Calcutta hockey without mention of Keshav Dutt or Gurbux Singh.

It may not be out of place to mention the historic running rivalry between Gurbux Singh's contemporary and India's penalty King Prithipal Singh and the then IHF President Ashwani Kumar. When Prithipal left Punjab police to join Northern Railways, Mr. Ashwani Kumar was upset. And as luck would have it, Northern Railway was to play Punjab Police in the final of Aga Khan Gold Cup in 1963. Mr. Ashwani Kumar instructed all Punjab players that they must give out their best to drive home a point that Prithipal committed a blunder in leaving the Punjab Police. But it was Prithipal who succeeded and scored the decisive goal in the final after the original game had ended in a draw. How this Aga Khan Cup final win proved costly for Prithipal was a story in itself? He was initially dropped from the 1964 Tokyo Olympic team but was recalled under media pressure but as a half back. Prithipal, however, refused to play as a halfback and wanted to be sent back home from New Zealand where India played some games on way to Tokyo Olympics. IHF relented and Prithipal created history by emerging as the top scorer in India's historic gold medal triumph. It was his penalty corner that India got a penalty stroke from where Mohinder Lal scored against Pakistan in the final.

It was not only Aga Khan. Other tournaments, too, have many many historic moments wrapped in their laps that need to be unfolded. And Nehru Hockey may have many many such anecdotes that make this prestigious annual event ever memorable.

While major Dhyan Chand did not get the chance to play in many civilian tournaments, other national stars used these tournaments to come to limelight with their outstanding performances. These tournaments were the platforms that gave every player a chance to corner glory. And they did.

A safe inference can be drawn that earliest hockey tournaments were started in major cities and towns Imperial Empire. that had a strong deployment of the British Army in and around them. These tournaments normally drew their competitors from Military and Naval forces besides top educational institutions run by the British.

The organizational support came from the British Army which was further supplemented by those business houses and individuals who were high on the list of the Imperial Empire. Besides, there was also voluntary support both manpower and monetary - from ardent fans of the game who, even filled the stands to watch their stars in action. Things did not change much after the Independence as some of these tournaments continued even while there was a partition-led turmoil in the country.

Nehru Hockey Tournament

As the country basked in the glory of seven Olympic gold medals in hockey, a number of tournaments started in the country. These included tournaments in areas other than Delhi, Bombay, Bhopal, and Calcutta. For example, Madras witnessed the introduction of Murugappa Cup while Punjab, the home of hockey, witnessed a series of new tournaments, including Surjit Memorial (Jalandhar), Gurmit Memorial (Chandigarh), Dasmesh Hockey (Ropar) and Liberal Hockey (Nabha).

In the union capital, All-India Jawahar Lal Nehru Hockey Tournament was started in 1964. It soon got international recognition with teams from overseas making a beeline to participate in this elite tournament. The tournament attracted the top 24 top teams of the country for its inaugural edition. In 1965, it got its first overseas participant from Japan that presented a handsome trophy for Hardliner cup winners.

Since then the tournament grew in its stature by spreading its wings to include competition for juniors and sub juniors. The popularity of the tournament could be judged by the growing number of hockey fans who never missed any match.

Administered by an experienced team, the tournament was on the top of the wish list of major hockey playing nations in Asia, Europe, and elsewhere. Shivaji Stadium in the vicinity of great Connaught Circus of Delhi became synonymous with Nehru Hockey.

Some of the big names of hockey, including Mr. Shiv Kumar Verma, Olympian Nandy Singh, and Harbinder Singh, Hockey Thinker, Coach and Umpire Gian Singh besides several others were indispensable members of a close-knit Nehru Hockey family. At present the steering wheel of Nehru Hockey is in the hands of Kukoo Walia, an illustrious son of an illustrious father. The Nehru Committee now conducts five tournaments every year.

Changing face of hockey tournaments

The post-Independence era witnessed the phenomenal growth of sports tournaments in general and hockey tournaments in particular. Most of these were organized by Groups of Sports Enthusiasts (GOSE), who had either sports background or were passionate about sports and games. These groups would collect donations, from individuals, groups, business and commercial houses, and even governments to conduct district, state zonal, or even national level tournaments committees.

Things started changing after the arrival of Television on the scene. Most of these GOSE started folding up as they could neither match business houses that started evincing interest in sports or the NSFs and ISFs holding major events on their own by thumping up the support of State or Central Government. Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, and Chhatisgarh are the obvious examples as they sponsored the major FIH events held on Indian soil in the last 10 - 15 years. Besides these States, so many Hockey me big industrial houses, including Hero, became the official title sponsor of important FIH mega-events.

As a sequel, marketing groups and companies, too, jumped in the sports organization. Introduction of TV instructed sports leagues perhaps acted as the last nail to be driven in the coffin of amateur sports. The situation has now come to such a pass that even the traditional print and electronic media started withdrawing itself from the volunteer-oriented sports activity while looking for its share of a bigger commercial cake.

t is both unfortunate and sad that such GOSE groups have almost withdrawn themselves and left the sports organization to event companies. Only exceptions are committees like Jawahar Lal Nehru Committee or Beighton Cup committee, that continue to hold aloft their batons.

And if the developments over the past 10 and 15 years of over-commercialization of sports tournaments were not enough, it is Corona that is coercing the organizers to keep spectators out of Stadiums and venues of competitions. It makes one shudder to imagine the future of local or provincial level sports tournaments following the Corona experience.

There is an impending need to restructure our sports competitions and tournaments by keeping involved all those passionate volunteers who not only give their time but also their expertise for the promotion of sports at the grass-root level. It is time for the GOSE groups to sit together, do some brainstorming, and come out with solutions by using electronic and social media besides involving marketing experts to create a win-win situation for all.

Sport in the Age of the Coronavirus

Far from breaking social barriers, the COVID-19 crisis actually reinforces them as elite sports coronate high achievers from India's despairing hinterland.

In Ingmar Bergman's *The Seventh Seal*, as plague claims half of Europe, a knight challenges Death to a game of chess to save himself and his friends. What follows is a celebration of the precious human life embodied in all of us.

In these perilous times, little plagues have lodged in our minds. Fear feeds on a dodgy social media. Millions of the poor are quarantined in neediness. From ringing bells to tapping pans, lighting candles to clapping hands, watching the *Ramayana* to setting up virtual conversations with loved ones, we need to calm our nerves.

What are the white knights of world sport doing? Pore through the Internet, switch on the television and enjoy retro sports and replays. Even chess, the most contemplative of sports, has gone virtual. Saina Nehwal's last hurrah in the Olympics is doubtful. Hockey player Gurjit Kaur calls the crisis a blessing in disguise. Really?

We see little Olympic sports where India has had success: hockey, shooting, boxing, wrestling, and weight lifting. So, fasten on to Star Sports' rewind of Pakistan's 0-7 World Cup defeats to India. Watching our pantomime warriors, we might be forgiven for thinking of the real ones, conducting raids across frontiers and aerial strikes against a sneaky enemy.

Television is orphaned of live sport. We get insomniac watching our beloved stars underperform in legacy tournaments. Who cares about the real stars health workers, law enforcement officials, ordinary citizens who are proving yet again that India works better in a crisis than in normal times?

Questions are swirling around in sport. Will athletes accept voluntary pay cuts? Will the ICC be chastened by nature's revenge on its pleasure alleys? Will sports figures speak up about our abuse of Mother Nature? Doubtful.

Diminished Britain sulks at loss of cricketing privilege, so Michael Atherton called the IPL disruptive. But human greed is inexhaustible. As India took charge, England and Australia scrambled to late fence-mending to stay in the game. Why would anybody want the IPL to lose its allure? Why would the BCCI start a real conversation with a world in lockdown? Global climbers do not step down voluntarily. But what will BCCI do with its wealth? We hear little about philanthropic instincts.

Elsewhere, things may be better. The Players Association announced England's centrally-contracted male cricketers will donate \$613,000 to the England Cricket Board and charities. The women's team has taken a three months' voluntary pay cut. Teams in football's Premier League will provide an advance of \$153 million to the Football League and National League sides.

The crisis has knocked the life out of sport. Wimbledon has been cancelled, a first since World War II. Scores of tournaments the World Athletics Indoor Championship; the Olympic boxing qualifiers; field hockey leagues in England, the Netherlands, Germany and Spain; the hockey Pro League; the Azlan Shah Cup; the Hockey Women's Asian Champions Trophy and football's Asian Champions League have been abandoned or postponed.

Postponement of the Tokyo Olympics could impact between 0.5-0.8% of Japan's GDP, according to the research firm Fitch. Postponement of Euro 2020 will cost Euros 250-300 million.

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With events gone or deferred, we are back to training. For some time we heard brave, morale-boosting words from athletes about remaining fit. No more.

Sportspersons struggle to make the virtual look real: doing routines like robots doing theirs in a quarantined piece of real estate on a celestial body.

In fairness, we can't blame athletes for lacking motivation to push hard. How can we train at home, without the trainer and support team? Starved of games (no team likes the long tour Down Under), Australian hockey has turned its drills into art, winning everything. Alas, India lacks the tacticians who might replicate such routines.

The one tactician available is the state. A crisis is the state's moment. It is the lifeline for both sages and self-servers. We are expected to exercise voluntary restraint on excesses. The state is watching.

Abhinav Bindra titled a chapter of his autobiography "Mr. Indian Official, Thanks for Nothing". Lately, sport in India has had forward movement because the state has loosened controls. Are we back to the age of meddlesome governments?

Elite athletes in India now get paid. Stars can fall by the wayside, paralyzed by the lockdown. But in Indian sport, athletes don't pay to play. Sport is a means to land a job in the government. Welfare is fashionable. If there were pay cuts, how would sportspersons respond?

Athletes can be immersed in their day jobs, from home. But since they are primarily players, how will they maintain motivation and morale in the uncertainty of the calendar?

This has raised issues of mental health. The postponement of the Olympics is "a step too far," says retired British Olympic rowing gold medallist Tom Ransley. Losing nerve, elite badminton players have criticized the BWF for putting players' lives at risk by going ahead with the All England Championships, drawing a sharp rejoinder.

So, it is doubtful that bonding in sport will deepen. How many of us have offered comfort to sportspersons who may be in depression, thinking about the wasted years of training? Far from breaking social barriers, the crisis actually reinforces them. Elite sports coronate high achievers from India's despairing hinterland, giving them a social lifeline. Yet, we just don't talk to athletes in India, it is not us. The rich simply sit on their perch.

We need earnest reasoning to heal our way out of the crisis. This means going back to the basics: the schoolboy joy of a 100-metre run, or Usain Bolt's trademark celebration after winning Olympic gold.

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"To sum up, karma is very much needed to enable us to understand the state of our minds.

Uncertain Future Awaits Domestic Hockey

All over the world, the Coronavirus pandemic has turned everyone's life upside down.. It has also caused the most significant disruption to the sporting calendar since World War II. Sports events had to be either cancelled or put off to a later date across the world because of the spread of this pandemic.

Like all other world sport, hockey activity had to be cancelled due to the pandemic. Hockey India postponed all its junior, sub-junior and senior national championships, which were slated to begin during the second week of April. As many as eight tournaments conducted by Hockey India stands cancelled/postponed in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The lockdown has changed people's lifestyles drastically as their movements are restricted. Isolation, social distancing and uncertainty in their jobs are causing panic and anxiety attacks among the less-fancied hockey players.

However, the most telling effect of this coronavirus is that it has brought the sporting economy to a shuddering halt. The lockdown and its implications threaten the very future and existence of domestic/local clubs, academies, leagues and the support staff. They all had been playing an important role in the promotion of hockey in the country, for several decades. Most domestic players and coaches come from financially moderate or poor family backgrounds. Hence, it is at such crisis period that they need all the possible help.

It is utmost important to keep grass-root players, coaches and other support staff in the game because without them there will be no intermediate or top level hockey in the country.

Here, one must appreciate the effort initiated and undertaken by former India hockey captain Viren Rasquinha who, saddened by the financial hardship faced by the hockey community amid Covid-19 pandemic, raised Rs 22 lakh within a period of one week to be distributed among players, coaches and groundsmen working at the grass-root level.

Similarly, Delhi-based hockey promoter K Arumugam, who has been helping hundreds of under-privileged children with free gear and coaching, has also been contributing his bit at his end. Domestic hockey needs more such people who are ready to come to the help of needy sportsmen.

Most sporting associations and federations are likely to be affected by economic crisis that they may face once sporting activities resume, with some restrictions, of course!

The pandemic has given local hockey clubs a different perspective. With no sporting activities for the past several months, most sports bodies are likely to face financial crisis in the future. They may not get the usual sponsorships from corporate and private agencies as in the past. Most domestic hockey associations do not have deep financial pockets or reserves to keep them going for long.

Despite hosting half-a-dozen age-group tournaments annually for the past 55 years and having provided dozens of talented players to the national team, the Jawaharlal Nehru Hockey Tournament Society had been finding it hard to sustain it for the last few years because of financial crunch. The coronavirus and resultant lockdown will only make things more difficult for its organisers, if and when things get back to near normalcy. The JNHTS's calendar of events for the new season should start in the month of October, if everything goes well.

Even with a dynamic and enterprising Kukoo Walia as its Secretary General, JNHTS will find it hard to keep the momentum going, given the present situation.

With no ticket sales (because of empty stadiums) and no television broadcast of final stages of the tournaments, things will not be the same for most local hockey bodies. Unless they get adequate support from government and other agencies, there could be lot of closures in the near future.

It remains to be seen how domestic hockey clubs will be affected financially, following the coronavirus outbreak. Even the 'regular' and hitherto 'most dependable' sponsors may think twice whether investing huge amounts of money into domestic tournaments will pay off.

The pandemic has not only affected the players but spectators as well. Hockey matches (like some European soccer games and the West Indies vs England Test series) may be played with empty stadiums for the foreseeable future. Domestic hockey could thus be headed for a tumultuous future. It will be a sad day for Indian Hockey!

OLYMPICS POSTPONEMENT, A MAJOR SETBACK: On the international arena, one of the most awaited sporting events in 2020 was the Tokyo Olympics. The Games were originally scheduled to be held from July 24 but has now been pushed to 2021.

The Indian hockey teams (both men and women) had rested much of their future hopes on their Tokyo Olympics' performances.

The postponement of the Tokyo Games at a time when both the Indian teams were eagerly waiting to give their best performances has upset players' rhythm. With no competitions for months, things will not be easy for the players to retain their old form although they have been training in SAI camps, attending online courses.

It is a curious phenomena that God has made the hearts of the poor, rich and those of the rich, poor.

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




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
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
